BEACHSIDE JULY GENERAL MEETING

The guest speaker at the July Beachside General Meeting was
Annie Barry, QMC.

Annie gave us an informative account of all the pitfalls she had to contend with in order to become the first female professional firefighter in Australasia. After 3 years of persistence and appeals to the Equal Opportunities Commission, Human Rights Commission and Members of Parliament, she was accepted as a firefighter in 1981. When applying, everything seemed against her (one inch too short - men were shorter), eyesight was not good (3 eye tests and specialists could find nothing wrong), but eventually she was accepted for a recruitment course, which she passed with flying colours and since then, has had a distinguished career in the Fire Service for over 20 years. Men thought women were not strong enough or emotionally suitable for this occupation, but she is a person who believes in fighting for what one believes in and never giving up.

Her first post to a Fire Station was in Ponsonby which was extremely busy as there were lots of old wooden villas and a new immigrant population who thought it was OK to light fires in a room! When on night shift, she would sleep fully clothed, apart from boots, so she was usually first to take her position in the engine. She also acquired her Heavy Vehicle Driver's Licence so she could drive a firetruck.

Her next post was to the Ellerslie Fire Station where she was involved with the big ICI chemical fire. She then went to Takapuna where she became very keen on upping her fitness and she competed in triathlons before being asked to enter an Ironman competition in 1987. With only 20kms to go her bicycle broke and she was disqualified but she repeated the Ironman the following year and came second.

In 1990 Annie received her QSM and upon wearing it to a Fire Services ceremony, was asked, by a senior officer, what was the Medal for!

In 1996 Annie retired and trained in fitness nutrition.

TAURANGA JULY GENERAL MEETING



Attendees at the U3A General Meeting on 16 July were treated to a very entertaining presentation by Stacey Roche where she outlined some of the goals and achievements that she has reached during her life to date. Having Cerebral Palsy since birth she faced more challenges than most of us but thanks to her parents, especially her father's advocacy on her behalf, plus her natural competitiveness and determination she has an impressive list of successes in her first four decades.

Her family did not take the doctor's advice when she was born, to put her in an institution as it was believed that she'd never walk or talk and had no intelligence; instead bringing her up as normal, with her older brother and sister. Although initially reluctant to enrol her at Katikati Primary School, due to her limited speech and inability to walk, the Principal was persuaded by her father to let her stay and although it was difficult and uncomfortable she never gave up. By the time she was at Secondary School, the biggest problem was that the gap between her and her peers had widened to the point that she had no friends and was very lonely; again, her father had to intervene. As a consequence, the Principal had a secret assembly with the class and from then on she had people talking to her.

Sport was very important in her family and Stacey wanted to participate too, the question was, "How to do this?" Inclusion in the school Cross Country was a real challenge but an inspired teacher devised a modified course that would allow Stacey to compete with integrity and finish mid-way through the pack. On the day, however, she actually won, which did not please everyone but did change her view of herself and was a real turning point in her life. At this time, she began to compete with other disabled athletes but despite her best efforts, not all sports were suitable.

Around the time she finished Secondary School and was preparing to go to university she discovered the sport of Bocce; similar in some ways to Petanque or to Bowls and to her delight she found she could do this and do it well! She quickly improved to the point that she became New Zealand Champion, then won in Australia and began to dream about competing in the Paralympics (Parallel Olympics}. After competing in New York and the next year in Argentina, her team qualified for the 2000 Paralympics in Sydney. To her ongoing disappointment, they only came 4th in the world.

Following this highlight, she returned to study, graduated with a BA degree, and began working with the Halberg Trust in Auckland, where her role was to teach others how to include disabled individuals into sports. She found this was an eye opener into how others can behave towards disabled people but after 11 years there and overcoming many challenges, Stacey has retired to the Bay of Plenty.

Her most recent challenges have been to climb both up and down Mt Maunganui plus, in collaboration with Fee O'Shea, to write a book, called "The Ups and Downs of a Dribbly Wobbly - A Roller Coaster Ride Through Life With CP". The book details the good, bad and ugly stories up till her 40th year and comes in two versions: the Blue one that is sanitised for younger, sensitive readers and the Grey one that includes swearing and dodgy stories.

BEETHOVEN COMES TO TOWN

The answers to these statements were well and truly answered at a talk recently, extremely ably given, by Vaughan Chetwynd, to two U3A groups. European History and Classical Music Lovers groups joined together to enjoy a talk on Beethoven's life. Wesley Chapel provided a very well equipped and accessible venue for the occasion.

Vaughan used a very innovative method of presentation combining narration, video, and musical expertise to share the pivotal moments of Beethoven's life. Ludwig's almost constant battle with deafness provided the basis for the discussion and included a very moving letter written by Beethoven to his brothers explaining attempts to endure and cope with this affliction.

So, if you were wondering, modern DNA taken from a lock of Beethoven's hair proved that he had a fatally high amount of lead in his blood! Apparently, in those days, lead was introduced into wine to make it sweeter and then was drunk from leaden goblets. Musical jokes were written as puns on the names of friends; some were puzzles where the recipient had to work out when and at what pitch a second voice might enter! We intend to invite Vaughan baagain, probably in November. I am hoping he will investigate the life of Wagner, who just happens to be my favourite composer! So, watch this space!

Robert Turnbull's Geology Book Collection

Robert Turnbull, the former convener of the U3A geology group for 10 years from 2010, was a pharmacist by profession but had a passion for geology. He accumulated up to 100 geology books and publications, as well as carrying out countless hours of research. With Robert's passing, his wife Kathy approached the group over the future of these publications. The group were pleased to be able to purchase books from his collection and \$91 donated to Waipuna Hospice. The reminder, some 64 books, have been stored and catalogued by the current convener.

While one could argue that much of this information is on line and forming a library a dubious exercise, they do provide a perspective at the time of publication and determining if the concepts are still relevant, is a point of discussion in itself. The geology group has a format, whereby recent global and local earthquakes and volcanic eruptions are reviewed, media articles considered as well as members taking turns researching and presenting on specific matters. We uncovered, for example, in a GNS report, evidence that Tauranga appears to sit on a very large volcanic crater, which erupted some four million years ago, (similar size to Taupo eruptions). So there is no shortage of geological matters that can be delved into, and Robert's legacy goes on with his efforts still appreciated.

Keeping Yourself Safe Online

The internet is just a part of life now and with the right tools and a few common-sense precautions, you can protect yourself online.

Security

- Have security software on your all your devices.
- run your updates regularly,
- use strong passwords,
- be careful about giving personal information to strangers online.

Passwords

Capital letters and numbers only go so far. Make it as difficult as possible for scammers. A suggestion is to take a sentence you'll remember and turn it into a password. Something like "This little piggy went to market" might become "tlpWENT2m".

Tips

- Choose a separate password for banking, don't use it for any other online programmes.
- Turn on 2 Factor Identification. This means you will need to enter your password and confirm a text sent to your mobile phone before you can logon.

Passwords are like underpants: Keep them private, change them often and never share them with anyone

Emails

Scam emails can be made to appear as if they come from a legitimate person or organisation.

- If an email asks you to give out private information, follow a web link, or do anything that seems iffy, don't respond to it. **Don't engage at all; delete it and move on.** Phone your friend on the number you know is his/hers and inform your friend of the request.
- If you're really worried – for example, you get an email that looks like it is from your bank – you can always call the bank or manually go to their website. But, don't follow the link or use the phone number provided in the email.

Be careful when giving your Credit Card details online

Verify that the web address begins with https. Also, check to see if a tiny, locked padlock symbol appears in the browser. **If they are not there, don't use it.**

There are also clues you can look for in the address, for instance, minor differences in spelling or script. There may be grammatical errors in the instructions given. Visit **Netsafe.org.nz** for more pointers and look carefully at the question below.

What to do if it happens to you?

- If your bank account has been compromised, contact your bank immediately.
- Report a scam you have noticed or been affected by. Reporting means you have the benefit of expert advice and are helping other people stay safe.

The "a" in the later url is a cyrillic alphabet.

An average internet user can easily fall for this. Be careful for every mail requiring you to click on a link.

Then there's Slope Point (pictured), the most southerly point of the South Island, where the wind-blasted trees grow at truly surreal angles.

And that's just for starters.

If you prefer touring the world by themes, at the foot of many of the pages are other options. The UK page, for examples, offers a choice of such topics as History, Art, Ruins, Museums, Architectural Oddities, Sacred Spaces, and so on and on.

There is even a section called Gastro Obscura, which claims to cover “the distinctive food locations of the world”. The website atlasobscura.com was set up by the American author Joshua Foer and documentary film maker Dylan Thuras. It is entirely free to use as a casual visitor or, if you wish to get into it more seriously, there is the option of joining as a member and contributing pictures and stories of your own to the database.

Thuras has said that one of the website’s main goals is “creating a real-world community who are engaging with us, each other, and these places and getting away from their computers to actually see them”.

With Covid-19 disrupting travel plans worldwide, however, Atlas Obscura has also launched a short four-times-a-week podcast taking armchair travellers to places they can’t get to in person, which anyone can sign up for. Try exploring Atlas Obscura for yourself and fly on your own imaginary journeys to exotic locations around the world. It could just be the perfect antidote to the lockdown blues.

Terry Boyle, the Convener of the Geology Group, forwarded the following advice for members undertaking outdoor activities. Please ensure new members are made aware of this information.

Members driving other group members should have a vehicle with a current warrant of fitness and an appropriate driver’s licence.

Vehicles should be parked more than two metres from the road edge.

Members walking along the edge of a road should be two metres from the edge.

If members have to cross the road please ensure there is good visibility.

A pre-visit to the area is ideal to identify safe places to park or cross roads and identify potential hazards. Remember you can check on google earth/street view

Do not discuss trip with the driver whilst they are driving. It is a good idea to outline the trip prior to leaving or after the transport is parked.

In summary the following steps should be taken:

1. Check with the weather on the Met Service website
2. Check NZTA website for road works

3. Convener to brief members on road safety prior to commencing the trip
4. Park 2m away from the edge of the road
5. Do not cross the road unless there is ample visibility
